Tree Protection Code: What's Permitted & What's Not

To ensure the preservation of White Salmon's tree canopy and environmental health, the city has established guidelines on what is permitted and not permitted under the *NEW* Tree Protection Code.

Types of Significant & Special Trees

- Significant Trees: Any tree 18 inches or more in diameter measured at 4.5 feet above grade.
- Special Trees: Specific native species that meet size thresholds:
 - o Cascara (Rhamnus purshiana) 8 inches diameter
 - o Pacific Dogwood (Cornus nuttallii) 8 inches diameter
 - o Ponderosa Pine (Pinus ponderosa) 12 inches diameter
 - Oregon White Oak (Quercus garryana) 8 inches diameter

Tree Removal Allowance by Lot Size per 12 months

- Up to 7,200 sq. ft. 1 tree
- 7,201 sq. ft. to 14,400 sq. ft. 2 trees
- 14,401 sq. ft. to 21,600 sq. ft. 3 trees
- 21,601 sq. ft. to 28,800 sq. ft. 4 trees
- 28,801 sq. ft. or greater 5 trees

Permitted Actions (No Permit Required)

- Removing the allowed number of significant/special tree(s) based on lot size within a 12-month period.
- Pruning trees (as long as pruning does not exceed 25% of the canopy per 12-month period).
- Removing dead or fallen trees (with photo documentation for city records).
- Planting new trees on private property.
- Removing hazard or nuisance trees (with documentation from a certified arborist or city approval).
- Emergency tree removal if the tree poses immediate danger to people or property (notify the city).

Not Permitted Without City Approval

- Removing a significant or special tree exceeding the allowed limit based on lot size or 12-month period.
- Removing trees in protected critical areas (wetlands, riparian zones, steep slopes, etc.).
- Topping trees (cutting the top off a tree in a way that harms its health).
- · Removing trees in an Oregon White Oak woodland.
- Causing damage to tree roots or trunks during construction.
- Ignoring required Tree Protection Zones (TPZ) during development projects.
- Exceeding allowable pruning limits (over 25% canopy reduction in a year).

Development & Construction Restrictions

- Tree Retention Plan Required: Any new construction, grading, or land alteration impacting significant/special trees must include a plan for tree retention and protection.
- Tree Protection Fencing: Must be installed around significant trees during construction.

Penalties for Non-Compliance

- Fines up to \$5,000 per illegally removed tree.
- Mandatory replacement of removed trees.
- Stop-work orders for development violations.
- Tree removal without permission may result in additional legal consequences.
